New neighbor Mary Jones on Faust near Chalfonte discovers that her thirteen year old has a stomach virus and is in dire need of medications. Mary's car is out of commission and it's 9:30 p.m. She rushes out of the house and heads for RiteAid. On the way, she passes both the young men on Foot Patrol duty that evening. They, in turn, call the Radio Patrol hotline and advise that a young woman needs escorting to and from RiteAid. One of the cars on duty that night shows up, picks up Mary and takes her to the store and back home.

To express her appreciation, Mary joins the neighborhood association. Because she's the only adult in her home, Mary questions whether she can sign up for either Radio or Foot Patrol. She's advised there are other activities she can volunteer for including becoming a part of the phone alert process on her block, helping the block captain in the meet and greet of new neighbors, volunteering to work on one of the community gardens located through Rosedale Park, or becoming more involved in the maintenance of the island on her street. Her son can sign up for lawn maintenance of vacant homes on the block and the semi-annual clean up at Flintstone Park. A few of these activities pique Mary's interest and she soon becomes an active participant in the Rosedale Park Community.

John Schwartz is a 35 year old computer programmer and web designer who has moved back to his parents' home on Greenview because the economic downturn resulted in him being unemployed for two years. He is now working and saving to move out and back to Royal Oak. He gets into a discussion with his next door neighbor and learns that the community is looking for someone to make their website more interactive and vibrant. John volunteers and finds a way that he can become engaged in the community by doing something he loves. Within two

years, he not only purchases a home in the Park but convinces two of his buddies to do the same. They spend lots of time at the newest coffee shop located in Grandland discussing joint ventures.

This neighborhood can be safer and residents can feel more secure. We can have productive community gardens that add beauty and produce to residents. We can create programs that help our aging population, attract younger people, tap into available monies to maintain and improve our homes and so much more. We can attract new businesses if we are viewed as a neighborhood where residents are comfortable being out and about in their community. We already have talent behind many of the closed doors in Rosedale who can take our communication vehicles to a new level; who can create and maintain new residential services such as foot patrol; who can envision changes that I cannot and then implement them through volunteer efforts. 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RPIA's 30-Block Garage Sale

Saturday, June 25th

9 AM - 2 PM (Rain or Shine)

How many of you have watched Antiques Roadshow? The program has been on PBS for a number of years. To me, it is always fascinating to see the items that wind up on the program and their appraised values. It's also interesting how many of these items were found in garage sales! RPIA is getting ready to sponsor our annual 30-Block Garage Sale. Realistically, will you be able to find anything in our 30-Block Garage Sale that'll make Antiques Roadshow? Probably not, but it's certainly fun to look.

RPIA's 30-Block Garage Sale has evolved over the years. In the past, we divided the park in half for the event. Using Artesian as the middle street, in odd years the sale would be on one side of Rosedale Park, even years the other side. Our 30-Block Garage Sale has caught on in other neighborhoods. Now, residents of North Rosedale, Grandmont and surrounding communities are holding garage sales on the 4th Saturday of June. This year our 30-Block Garage Sale will be open to all residents on all streets in Rosedale Park.

Did you know that we have a local 'garage sale expert' in Rosedale Park? Ben Washburn (Glastonbury resident and past RPIA president) passes on some of his 'Garage Sale Wisdom':

- Stuff sells better when it's clean and fixed. Nobody wants to buy something that's dirty; neither will they buy something that doesn't work. If it doesn't work, it's probably not worth trying to sell.
- Consider joining your table(s) with that of a neighbor. That way, you or your neighbor can take turns holding down the fort, while the other goes to check what other folks are selling.
- Tag each item with both a price and a number. Do this well before the sale day. This takes

some time, thought and research, but it really is a key to success. If you don't know a price, check eBay or a thrift store.

- Set a fair price and stick with it (unless you enjoy haggling). But keep a notepad handy where people who offer less can leave their name and phone number in case the item does not sell. That's where the item number comes in handy.
- About half of the day's buyers will show-up during the first hour and a half of the day (that's from 9 – 10:30 AM). So, get up early and be ready for the surge. If showers are forecast, keep your items in a compact area, and have a big sheet of plastic ready to cover it quickly, along with some heavy weights to hold it down.
- Here is a list of things that sell well:
 - Lawn and garden tools and supplies
 - All types of tools
 - Extra house and garden plants
 - Dressers and nightstands
 - Unused auto parts from your last car
 - Toys, cameras, dishes and flatware
 - Pots, pans & kitchenware
 - Building materials and supplies.
 - Locks, hinges & hardware
 - Landscaping materials.
 - Picture frames & books
 - Electronics – Converter boxes and TVs
 - Small appliances
 - iPods and Video games
 - Baby clothes and infant items
 - Tables and chairs
 - Costume jewelry and personal care items
 - Bicycles and children's toys
 - Lawnmowers and snow blowers.
 - Coffee makers & kitchen 'gadgets'

Here are a few other garage sale suggestions.....

- Have some grocery bags on hand for packing items. Also, enough small bills and coins to make change.
- On a security note, keep money out of sight and never allow any stranger in your house to 'go to the bathroom.'
- For public health reasons, do not sell prepared food (ribs, coleslaw, etc). Unless you have a

Food Handler's Permit, it's illegal to sell food. Also, don't purchase prepared food from someone on the street. You don't know that person's hygiene, the condition of the food or how it was cooked. Buying food from someone on the street, who may or may not have been trained in sanitation, is just a great way to get sick.

- No alcohol sales; that can get you in trouble.
- If your child wants to have a 'Pop Stand' that's fine.
- Be friendly. Say hello and greet those who pass by.
- Do not block the sidewalk with your goods.
- Please make an effort to drive safely. Watch out for children darting out from between parked cars.

And finally, this is from Ben Washburn and I think it's quite true, "You will be forever amazed at the things which people will snap-up with glee, giving you a jingle in your pocket, space in your closets, and a zing in your weekend!"



We're Testing a New RPIA Email System: Eblast!

The Rosedale Park Improvement Association is testing a new way of communicating with residents using email.

Why should we use email this way?

We don't want to make changes just for the sake of changing, but there are many reasons to use new technologies to communicate with members.

- The cost of printing and mailing the Rosedale Park News is putting a strain on RPIA's budget. We won't totally abandon printed communication because not everyone has access to email. But we can reduce costs significantly by using modern technology.
- Info can be sent out in a much more timely manner. Printing and mailing adds up to two weeks to the process of getting news out to residents.
- We can send targeted messages to block captains, board members, committee members, radio patrol

members... even messages targeted to individual blocks! We will be trying out different ways to use this technology during the test period.

What to expect

We'll be testing the flexibility of this service over the next few weeks. We will create mail lists and send some targeted test emails, and we will also see which email addresses are valid and which ones "bounce back" to us. The new Mapping Project highlighted in this issue of the newsletter outlines the effort being made to update our data base for residents.

Spring Clean Up Tips

Garden lovers can start preparing the soil for planting. Rake out your yard only when the ground is dry to avoid damaging the new grass growing. Clean out flower beds so that early spring flowers can breathe. Spring is the time to plant bushes, trees, and shrubs. They should be planted before temperatures reach the 80's on a consistent basis. This is also the time to plant grass seeds or fresh sod.

Perennial Care

For your Roses, Hydrangea, Azalea and other perennials, purchase a really good fertilizer and apply early on for beautiful summer blooms. Cut away any dead limbs.

Island Judging in Spring

Stroke Kept McGee From Sculpture's Debut

The night before the scheduled unveiling of a major new public sculpture in Detroit by Rosedale Park resident Charles McGee, he remained hospitalized because of a stroke he suffered on Sunday, April 3rd. McGee's work entitled "Spirit Renewal," a massive work of jazzy interlocking black and white shapes, made its formal debut at the Art X Detroit festival along with those of 38 Kresge artist fellows and prominent artists at nearly 50 free events in several Midtown locations. McGee, who is known for his vibrant sculpture and mixed-media works, is known as the dean of local visual artists. His works are on display at the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Charles H.

Wright Museum of African American History, Broadway Street People Mover Station and several hospitals. McGee was named the first Kresge Eminent Artist in 2008 and received a \$50,000 lifetime achievement prize awarded from them. They then commissioned "Spirit Renewal" for Art X Detroit. The sculpture can be permanently viewed as a part of the Midtown landscape outside the Horace H. Rackham building on East Farnsworth. It is a massive work of jazzy, interlocking black and white shapes proclaiming the arts. Residents of Rosedale Park not only congratulate Mr. McGee on this spectacular presentation of his work but also on his wonderful contribution to the world of art in Rosedale Park, in Detroit, and in Michigan!

Rosedale/Grandmont Open House

Carolyn informed the board members of the upcoming Open House scheduled for May 1st. There is a need for the members to work with local businesses they are familiar with to encourage them to participate and be marketed during the Open House. First Vice President Position

Thom Gatson provided financial reports and current bank statements supporting the operational budget and rainy day fund monies charted on the monthly summary report. Dues monies received for 2011 and 2012 have been broken down and allocated for the board to see. Thom discussed the expenses that were paid out within February and March 2011. Pam shared a need to have a running budget report to help in curbing the spending to keep the board within budget. Debbie discussed a report she is familiar with and that she would work with Thom on developing the report to meet the need Pam expressed. The board also reviewed the funds that RPIA is fiduciary over for radio patrol and discussed setting up a separate account to restrict the use of these funds to radio patrol.

Advertiser Invoicing

Dorothy has volunteered to help RPIA in setting up the advertiser invoicing in the QuickBooks software. With the absence of Darryl Brown to provide the needed information, this project has been placed on hold momentarily.

Code Violations

Stacy suggested that the RPIA open up the website to allow residents to report any code violations within the neighborhood. These violation reports can be followed up by the appropriate committee. The board agreed that this undertaking would require a committee of at least 4 volunteer residents to successfully enforce code violations. Stacy will work on recruiting volunteers and research the way in which North Rosedale has done it.

Easter Egg Hunt – April 23rd

Chris discussed the upcoming Easter Egg Hunt and the possibility of discontinuing it. With the reduction of the newsletter printing, advertising would have to be done differently. The board

discussed the option of continuing the event with the decline in children and resident volunteer support. The board decided to continue the event and give a formal evaluation of it after this year.

Mapping Project

Pam requested funds for printing efforts in the mapping project. The board discussed reallocating funds within the budget to cover this unbudgeted expense.

In March 2011, a portion of Rosedale Park was selected to be the first Detroit neighborhood to participate in the Better Buildings for Michigan energy efficiency program. We need to re-do our resident rosters to include new residents and also to make sure that the information we have on our tried and true residents is still accurate. We also need to know which homes are vacant.

Accurate information is important for your RPIA organization for many reasons. We need correct names and addresses because we send out the ROSEDALE PARK NEWS to everyone in the neighborhood twice a year so that non-members can see who we are, what we are accomplishing, and why they should join with us and become active members. We also need accurate email addresses for all residents so that we can use electronic communication in between issues of the newsletter, to notify residents of important events or meetings, and also to alert them about suspicious or criminal activities in our area.

Having accurate information has helped us out more than once. One group of RPIA residents helped prevent an illegal business from establishing themselves within our boundaries. Another time, we were able to call the nearby neighbors of a home that was being burglarized and the police responded to the neighbors' calls and caught the perpetrators.

1580 homes, 63 blocks...one block at a time There are many reasons why an accurate mapping of our neighborhood and its residents will benefit our community. And that is why we are asking you to help. There are 1580 homes in Rosedale Park. We have activated our network of over 55 block captains, asking each one to

contact every household on their block, to make sure we have complete and accurate information on every address in our entire area.
