President's Message

Whew!!! It's been quite a summer. The heat and

humidity have successfully scorched many of our lawns and stopped the growth of our flowers. At the same time, we have less work to do to maintain vacant properties. While we have more filled homes, the association is hearing about more violent crimes occurring within our boundaries. More wildlife has appeared in the neighborhood. Some enjoy the sight of rabbits hopping across the lawn but others find them annoying and bothersome when vegetables crops are ruined and other damage results. There haven't been many children outside playing which may be a blessing for some but definitely not for the parents who are trying to amuse the little ones inside.

Yes, we can find the negative and the positive in most situations. It's up to you to decide how you will greet the challenges of your day. A little story to demonstrate this point follows:

A young woman went to her mother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up.

Block Captains' Corner

Happy Autumn Everyone!!

We would like to extend a big thank you to all the Block Captains who turned out for the quarterly Block Captains' meeting at GRDC on July 17th. We are already working and planning for the October meeting. Block Captains are the backbone of this community and your block should be proud of the efforts you are making to make this a safe and secure community as well as a community that works well together to make life in Rosedale Park better for everyone.

At the meeting in July we discussed the safety issues in the community. We are keeping the neighbors up to date on what has been happening in the way of crimes and what we can do to keep the crime level down. Be cautious when entering and exiting your vehicle. Be alert to unusual activity on your block. Be especially observant about suspected criminals so that you can provide the police with a description of the person or persons who are the suspected wrongdoers. Take pictures if you are able to do that safely. With this assistance, the police have been able to make arrests and cut the number of threats to our neighbors.

Some of the items we talked about included the Mapping Project, tree planting and tree removal, road improvement/ resurfacing and tree limb cutting for traffic sign visibility. We also discussed the ways and means of collecting information about vacant homes and removing squatters from them, the means of making the owners (including banks) keep up the vacant properties and what we can do to make them accountable.

Concerns were expressed at our meeting about the abundance of street potholes. Please note the following contact numbers:

- 3. To report potholes on county roads call 888-ROAD-CREW
- 4. To report potholes on state roads call MDOT at 888-296-4546

We trust that all of the annual block parties were a great success and that all the new (and older) neighbors on the block were able to get to know each other and begin to develop good relationships all around. WINNER'S CIRCLE CHOSEN FROM LAST SEASON'S FINALISTS


Last season, the Garden Club was so impressed that they couldn't decide on a winner and designated three as finalists for the first place prize: Ashton (Fenkell to Chalfonte); Rosemont (Eaton to Chalfonte); and Warwick (Keeler to Midland). All three received top-honor prizes at the RPIA banquet, but only one was to be selected to be eligible for the Winner's Circle plaque. The three islands were viewed earlier this spring and the winner was Ashton, between Fenkell and Chalfonte.

The island was viewed again late this season and was found to have maintained its high standards and beauty to qualify for the Winner's Circle, which will be awarded to them at the annual RPIA Banquet in January, 2012. TIPS FOR FALL

By the end of September and early October, residents should "dead head" their roses. This means taking the dead blooms off. Perennials should be cut down at this time, as well. Perennials that can be cut to the ground include day lilies and Stella D'Oro plants. Perennials that should be cut two inches above ground include coreopsis. New roses should be packed with 3 inches of leaves or mulch (like a blanket), to prevent frost.










Fresh, Local Food!

Summer Storm Topples Tree

On Monday, July 18th the maple tree at the corner of Warwick and Chalfonte was struck by lightning; it fell and blocked the street. It was noted that there were carpenter ants inside the tree stump, which could have contributed to its weakening. Fortunately, no one was hurt and the tree was cleaned up by the city.

What Do I Do With Tree Debris?

Pam Weinstein, RPIA Board member, received the following helpful information from DPW Director Ron Brundidge: "DPW's policy regarding yard waste is as follows: yard waste will be collected weekly (on regular Courville collection day) if waste is placed in paper bags, in front of the house next to the container. Tree limbs less than 4 feet in length and 2 inches thick can be bundled and placed in front of the house for collection as yard waste. Also, be informed that Forestry operations are managed under the city's General Services Department, not DPW. Typically, debris generated from street trees is collected by this operation."

So what do we do with the large limbs that fall down from trees growing on the island and from trees growing on the berms? Some residents place these limbs and various branches and tree debris on their islands, probably assuming that the City will pick them up. However, that almost never happens. Neighbors must make a call to 3-1-1 and make a report and request that General Services, Forestry Division, come out and pick up the debris they have placed on the island. The regular DPW trucks that come to pick up the regular yard waste will NOT pick up debris on the islands.



Dear Rosedale Resident,

This year marks the completion of 21 years of Rosedale Recycles. The City moves gradually in the direction of comprehensive recycling and we continue our work. As part of Zero Waste Detroit, we succeeded in getting language into the Reform City Charter that is anticipated to be up for voter approval in November, language that mandates the City to give top priority to materials recovery prior to disposal. This is a significant achievement, as the Charter Commissioners changed their positions to support the new language for recycling. In addition, along with other members of Zero Waste Detroit, we have diligently monitored developments to further recycling in the City and to end public subsidies for incineration. We offered the paper shredder twice, due to popular demand, and that will continue.

As in every year, we consistently have first-timers who are eager to start recycling. Scout troops and honor students volunteer with us regularly. We continued working with RecycleHere as our on-site vendor, and with the City to promote the curbside recycling program. Annual data: July 2010—June 2011, Rosedale Recycles collected and reclaimed for recycling over 98,000 pounds, or 49+ tons, of materials, plus 4 tons with the paper shredder. That is an increase of over 5 tons!

Total income was \$1157.31: revenue from RecycleHere was only \$156; donations were \$657.00. Hiring the shredder cost us \$600 net—Grandmont Rosedale Development Corporation assisted with \$200.00. We maintained our monthly contributions (total of \$1200) toward the upkeep of the parking lot at Christ the King. Net for the year was negative \$2039, and our fund balance is \$4781, down from \$6819.50. A complete copy of our financial records is available upon request.

As we continue our monthly collection siteplease consider financial support to ensure our ability to offer this service. Your tax-deductible donation will sustain our efforts. As always, donors of \$25.00 or more will be given a Rosedale Recycles card.
