President's Message

I can't believe that it is time to say good-bye to another summer. What a summer it was with record heat and little rain. This certainly provided ample opportunity to reconnect with folks we had not seen for awhile.

I was reminded recently that we are moving toward the 100-year anniversary of the construction of the first home in Rosedale Park. On November 15, 1917, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Barkley moved into their new home with their infant son. Their home on the northwest corner of Ashton and Chalfonte remains as one of the finest (and largest) homes in our neighborhood and is the current home of Harvey and Austerine Hambrick, long-time neighborhood and community supporters. This has made me think of what a rich and important history is contained in the generations of families who have called Rosedale Park their home.

I met a young couple in August who had recently moved from Novi with their two young sons to a home on Penrod. They indicated that they chose Rosedale Park because they were looking for community and wanted to "come home." They have already connected with neighbors on their block to address needed clean-up and planting work on their island. Their sons have signed up for the Rosedale Soccer League. The house they purchased needed some work but has very good bones. New paint, carpeting, and kitchen countertops have begun the process of making this home their own. Their enthusiasm and commitment is contagious.

This encounter reminded me of how happy my husband and I were to be able to purchase our home on Rosemont in 1972. With our two-year-old daughter, we moved in and started the "clean up, fix up, paint up" routine that is seemingly never ending. Wallpaper on every wall needed to be stripped. Old window coverings needed to be replaced, etc., etc. One year we were able to redo our kitchen thanks to the design and construction help of my newly retired uncle. Another year we contracted with a Rosedale Park neighbor to gut and rebuild a bathroom. Just this year we replaced the original boiler which had been converted from coal to oil to gas. This newer, much more efficient model has certainly saved us energy costs already. However, the maintenance list continues since we intend to preserve this home for future families.

Over the past forty years we have lived in this house we brought home two more babies, celebrated many birthdays and graduations, held large and small family gatherings, entertained friends and mourned losses. In the early years we were members of a food cooperative and a babysitting cooperative. We learned to try different vegetables and recipes and knew that our children were being well cared for by other parents. Our children developed a greater extended neighborhood family through the co-ops and their grade school. Those relationships continue for them into their adulthood, especially through electronic communication. Those moms with whom I shared child raising are now, in retirement, sharing a love of reading and exchanging ideas through a neighborhood book group that meets in our Rosedale homes once a month.

Neighborhoods don't just happen. A true caring community takes work and patience. Our new neighbors on Penrod understand that already and I know that they are not alone. Let's all remember each day to be grateful for the rich history that surrounds us and the example of those who have gone before us. As the cooler weather forces us indoors, be sure to keep those lines of communication open with the people who surround you.



For those of you who still have school-aged children, September tends to be one of the "happiest" times of the year. Back to school! Since June, many have spent time keeping the young people constructively occupied Well, here's what some have to say about the matter: The word **Autumn** comes from the Old French word *autompne* (*automne* in modern French), was later normalized to the original Latin word *autumnus*, and

became common by the 16th century.

Before the 16th century, harvest was the term usually used to refer to the season. However, as more people gradually moved from rural to urban areas, the word "harvest" lost its reference to the time of year and came to refer

only to the actual activity of reaping, and "autumn," as well as "fall," began to replace it as a reference to the season.

Fall is mostly a North American English word for the season. It traces its origins to old Germanic languages. The term came to denote the season in 16th century England, a contraction of Middle English expressions like "fall of the leaf" and "fall of the year".

During the 17th century, English emigration to the British colonies in North America was at its peak, and the new settlers took the English language with them. While the term Fall gradually became obsolete in Britain, it became the more common term in North America, where autumn is nonetheless preferred in scientific and often in literary contexts.

All that being said, in the United States, the first day of Fall/Autumn is the day of the year when the Sun crosses the celestial equator moving southward. This

year the first day of Fall/Autumn is September 22, 2012.

to school, we as a community need to ensure that those who walk to school or to the bus stop are safe. We can aid in achieving safety by doing a few simple things:

- Make certain there are no open and dangerous vacant homes on your block. To report a vacant property, call 313-836-4737 or email msdeborahkent@aol.com.
- If you have a dog, walk him between the hours of 7:00 and 8:30 AM, during the time most students are on their way to school.
- Plan to leave for work 5-10 minutes early to drive through the neighborhood, and don't forget to drive past your own house. Keep the criminal minds guessing.
- Parents should try to identify one or two "safe houses" where your child can go for help if your home is too far away in case of trouble.

These simple tips can help keep our young people safe during this school year.

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
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


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NOMINATE NEIGHBORHOOD VACANT PROPERTY VOLUNTEERS!

It takes a LOT of people to keep track of and take care of all of the vacant houses in our neighborhood. Please do all that you can to maintain the yards of the vacant houses on your block – pick up trash and flyers, and do what you can to make the house look occupied. 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
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RPIA Board Meeting Minutes

Make Your Home More Comfortable!

Grandmont Rosedale Development Corporation (GRDC) is partnering with BetterBuildings for Michigan to offer a low-cost Energy Audit for residents of the City of Detroit. This audit could save you hundreds of dollars on your energy bills. A similar program was offered to 480 Rosedale Park residents in early 2011, and nearly 100 residents participated!

For \$50, Grandmont Rosedale residents will receive a comprehensive audit conducted by a BPI Certified Building Analyst. The audit includes an air leakage and insulation test using a blower door and infra-red camera, installation of a programmable digital thermostat, replacement of your incandescent bulbs with high efficiency CFL bulbs and installation of a low-flow showerhead. They will also check all appliances for gas leaks and provide a personalized report on your home energy usage, along with quotes for recommended energy-saving home improvements.

Residents are eligible to save hundreds of dollars on their energy bills, and get cash back on energy-saving investments in their homes. This could include 0% APR financing or up to \$3,000 in incentives toward any energy -saving projects you choose!

Your volunteer Vacant Housing Committee keeps making calls to owners or banks or whomever to come take care of their properties. Sometimes we are successful, sometimes

picked up during bulk pickup the following Tuesday.

A special big "thank you" goes out to these neighbors who joined me in attacking the overgrown jungle: Creighton Adams, Jill Laufer, Phil Schloop, Dale Reid, Charlene Studstill, Margie Weber, Pam Weinstein, and Donna Wilson and her mom, Joan!

The GRDC wants to recognize all vacant-property volunteers at a community-wide ceremony in October. If you or someone you know has helped to maintain a vacant home, send their (and your) name and address before September 20th to bkenderes@grandmontrosedale.com. An invitation will be sent to you and the volunteer you recognize.

This hard-working group got everything cut down and to the curb in about three and a half hours--all in all, a total of almost 30 hours of work in that amount of time. People Power! Thank you to everyone!

In addition, a big "thank you" to DPW Director Ron Brundidge and his employees for the great job they did in Rosedale Park with bulk pick-up last month. What a lot of stuff they carted off! Thank them when you see them next.

Now, it's up to us homeowners, and this means YOU: once we clean up one of these seriously neglected homes, it cannot fall to the same 10 people in the Park to keep returning to clean. Blocks, residents, Block Captains, and

This makes the home look occupied and less likely to be vandalized and keeps it more pleasant for you to look at while you wait for a new family to move in.

We know there are a lot of you neighbors who are already mowing the lawns next door and cleaning up. There are some homes that are vacant that we don't even know about because of your hard work in making them appear occupied! The foreclosures are not over, so now that we are smarter and know what to do, keep it up, and thank you.
